Transport

The Institute is a 20min from King's Cross and Euston mainline railway stations, and is easily accessible by underground from other national and international rail terminals including Charing Cross, Waterloo, Victoria, Marylebone, Paddington and Liverpool Street. The closest underground stations are Great Portland Street on the Circle/Hammersmith/Metropolitan line; Regents Park on the Bakerloo line and Oxford Circus on the Central/Northern/Victoria line.

Parking

The Institute has no parking facilities of its own, but is within short walking distance of National Car Parks in Carburton Street and Cleveland Street. Short stay metered parking is also available outside the Institute's premises, and in adjacent roads.

Facilities for the Disabled
